
Dear Friends:

The months of April and May propel us into some of the most celebrative Sundays of the FCC church year. Here are a few upcoming highlights:

On April 7, the congregation is being called to a special congregational meeting to vote on the design priorities for our anticipated capital improvements.

This is an exciting and important decision for our congregation as we update our beautiful building and address the future vitality of our church!



- On Maundy Thursday, April 18, at 7 p.m., we will gather in the sanctuary for a quiet and reflective service of readings, candles, and communion, which is commemorated on the night before Jesus' crucifixion. During the service, we will remember key elements of the life and teachings of Jesus. The service begins in light and ends in darkness, symbolizing Jesus' journey to the cross.
- On Good Friday, April 19, we will join with First Baptist Church of Ann Arbor and First United Methodist Church of Ann Arbor from Noon to 1:30 p.m., at the First United Methodist Church, to share in three half-hour services in remembrance of Jesus' crucifixion. Three different preachers will help us focus on the meaning of the Good Friday event, along with prayers, readings, and hymn singing.
- On Saturday evening, April 20, we will gather in Pilgrim Hall for the 4:09 p.m. Easter Eve Contemporary Service, the first of the two Easter celebration services we are offering this year. The 4:09 p.m. service will feature Terry Farmer and music from Jesus Christ Superstar and Darcy Crain as the preacher. Please note the odd starting time of 4:09 p.m.! Light refreshments will be served.

- On Easter Sunday morning, April 21, we will begin our morning of celebration with the 9:30 a.m. Easter Sunday Chapel Communion, followed by the 10 a.m. Easter Celebration Service, with very special music, in the sanctuary, followed by the traditional and always delicious Easter Pancake Breakfast in Pilgrim Hall. The 10 a.m. Easter Celebration Service this year will feature Mozart's Coronation Mass, an inspiring and outstanding musical piece for choir with string orchestra, brass, oboes, and timpani. I guarantee the whole morning will be a festive and moving experience as we celebrate the good news of Christ's resurrection together.
- On Sunday, May 5, Confirmation Sunday, we will celebrate the confirmation of three of our eighth-grade youth with a special confirmation ritual during our 10 a.m. worship service, and, of course, cake to follow in Pilgrim Hall.
- On Sunday, May 12, Mother's Day, we will celebrate our mothers, our FCC women, and our families. This is always a special time!
- On Sunday, May 19, Christian Education and Youth Sunday, we will recognize our church school children and youth in worship, as we also thank our children's and youth group leaders. Our children and youth will take the lead in conducting the service.
- Finally, on Sunday, May 26, Remembrance Sunday, we will recognize and remember those beloved church members who, during the past year, have entered God's eternal realm, as we also remember and honor persons who have died while serving our country and our own loved ones who have passed away.

As you can see, the months of April and May are busy months here at FCC! Please take a look inside the April-May Courier for more details on all of these special church events.

Corners of Your Mind

Lent began the way it does every year for me, with an Ash Wednesday service. As I remember Rev. Paul Duke saying, today is not a day to wallow in guilt. It's not to set resolutions; as if all God requires is a slightly better version of ourselves. It is about pushing everything that stands between us and God aside to fully live into who we were created to be.

That evening and the week to follow I prayed about what these things were. What stands between myself and God and the work God has called me to do? Am I properly identifying it? Am I willing to push it aside? It seemed I was looking for a giant road block type of barrier and was struggling to find what that giant barrier was. I wasn't loving the image my prayer life was giving me; myself on one side, God on another, the space between us impassable.

About a week later I went into the office for a "normal" day. I was spending most of the day in the office; prepping lesson plans, creating retreat programs, emailing, proofing bulletins, that sort of thing. Spoiler alert: there is no such thing as a normal day in ministry. So about noon, we had a distressed couple enter in the midst of a medical emergency. The woman could barely stand, she was so weak and tired. Our staff is compassionate and wonderful. Sandra attended to her needs, making sure she had a safe place to sit, then lie down, fruit, coffee, and water. The woman was in no state to make the 55-minute bus ride, with two to three transfers that she would require in order to get to her doctor's appointment on the other side of town. The couple asked if we could help them with an uber or cab to the appointment. I offered to drive them instead, quickly cleaning up the bits of goldfish crackers, half-finished water bottles, and cheerios that litter the back of my minivan on any given day. I chastised myself for not being cleaner, having tidier children, and also for keeping my gas tank at a perpetually near-empty state because I procrastinate.

On the way to the appointment, the woman asked her husband to sing for us; it always calmed her down. As I flew down 94, praying we wouldn't run out of gas before arriving, he sang a beautiful acapella version of a gospel song. One of the lyrics was a plea, that Jesus would come in and reach into the furthest corners of our mind. That lyric helped me understand Lent in a brand new way. I wasn't staring at an impassable abyss between God and myself, trying to identify and move some barrier that I had placed there with my own wrongdoings. No, Lent was the time to invite Jesus into the corners of my mind. The darkest corners. The corners where I keep my deep insecurities and hide my vulnerabilities. The corners that I don't want anyone to see, let alone Jesus. They are the corners Lent invites us to clean out. They are the spaces we invite Jesus into because these are the spaces he wants to shed light upon. There is no barrier; he is already there with us. Lent is the time to echo the song I heard driving down 94 on empty from a man willing to take Jesus by the hand into the dark corners of his own mind. As I dropped them off and headed to a gas station, I turned off the radio. I sat in the corners I'd rather ignore. I invited Jesus to come and sit with me.

So much for a normal day.

The work of Lent my friends is a different image to everyone. As we anticipate holy week and the joy of Easter morning I invite you to continue to do the spiritual work God calls us to; not to become a slightly better version of ourselves, but to live and love fully as the people God created us to be.

All-Church Picnic follows Youth Sunday Service on Sunday, May 19th. There will be a bounce house, grilling, and a root beer keg!




HISTORIAN'S CORNER BETTY BISHOP

ow did our present church come to be built? In 1865 the Church voted to build a new and larger church to replace the brick colonial-style church at the northeast corner of Fifth and Washington Streets. Money was a major concern and, despite various efforts, nothing more happened until the fall of 1869, when Judge Thomas Cooley of the State Supreme Court and an active member of the church made several resolutions. One added three women to the all-male committee charged with building the church while another increased pew rent by fifty percent, and a third established a "Ways and Means" committee to raise money for the purchase of a site and the building of a church.

By February 1870 there was enough financial support to purchase the site at the corner of State and William and make the first payment on the lot. In September 1871 the trustees

employed Gordon W. Lloyd, the Detroit architect who had designed St. Andrews Episcopal Church. The plan was for a church of stone, with a basement, to resemble St. Andrews but somewhat shorter, somewhat higher, and with a tower and spire if the finances allowed those to be built. By June 1873 the cornerstone was laid with a copper box containing abstracts from the church records with a list of members and officers, information about the Sabbath School and various church societies, a list of trustees, the church most recent manual, missionary magazines, city papers, University calendar, and the Union School catalog. Finally, the church was completed and dedicated on May 10, 1876. It seated 650 and included a "splendid organ" just behind the pulpit. The dedication was attended by a



large number including ministers from the First and Second Congregational churches of Detroit, Congregational churches in Jackson and Grand Rapids, and the Baptist, Methodist, Episcopal, and Presbyterian churches in Ann Arbor.

YOUTH MINISTRIES CONFIRMATION

April our confirmation class will meet for the remainder of our two classes, on April 14 and April 28, from 11 a.m.–12:30 p.m.. On Sunday, April 14, our class will take place at Island Park for a special reaffirmation of our baptism services in the Huron River. Mentors, parents, and extended family are invited and encouraged to attend. Darcy will carpool the students there following church. We will arrive at approximately 11:45 a.m. and will conclude the service by 12:30 p.m. The final two events take place on May 2 (Thursday) from 6–8 p.m. in the Mayflower Room and Chapel. We will share in a dinner together with families and mentors and then go to the chapel to hear the youth read their faith statements and share communion. The semester culminates on May 5, with Confirmation Sunday during the 10 a.m. worship service.

BOARD of CHRISTIAN EDUCATION ELLEN RAMBO

he Lenten and Easter seasons are busy times in church school. We will celebrate Easter with the annual Easter egg hunt during part of the regular church school time. School-aged guests are always welcome and encouraged to join us.

Please come down to the church school to see the new windows in the preschool rooms! Designed by FCC member and mission trip veteran Scott Allen, the windows are beautiful additions to the rooms, energy efficient, and allow for an unlikely emergency evacuation.

BOCE is responsible for the distribution of Scrip revenues which support the spring intergenerational mission trip and the summer high school mission trip. BOCE approved allocating \$500 to both the March 31st intergenerational in-house work day and the June senior high trip to Detroit. An additional \$500 was reimbursed to the church for the original Scrip program seed money.

Please keep in mind that Evening Vacation Bible School will take place July 7 through 13.

SENIOR HIGH ACTIVITIES

Our senior high youth group gathered for a spring retreat the first weekend of April, April 6–7, at the home of Nancy and Mike Sauve. They generously offered their beautiful Whitmore Lake home as a retreat facility for the weekend so that our youth could experience time away from Ann Arbor to disconnect from stressors of school and reconnect to God and the world God created.

We also are in the planning stages of Youth Sunday, which will take place on May 19 during our 10 a.m. worship. This is the service that is youth-led. This year will include voices and music from our middle school class as well as music from our youth hand chime choir. We need readers, ushers, musicians, dancers and anything creative you can bring to make this service amazing! Our planning sessions will be April 28, May 5, and May 12 during our church school hour.

We continue to get excited about our mission trip with Motown Mission in Detroit from June 16–22.

TREASURER'S REPORT MIKE DABBS

We have completed the first eight months of our Fiscal Year on February 28th. Pledge payments continue to remain on pace with the annual budget, which has been a big help for our cash flow. Thank you to all members for your contributions! We have also received payments from a number of members for the capital campaign, which are also reflected on the report. These funds are in the process of being transferred to our BOAA account for the Capital Campaign.

Expense categories are staying less than the budget. There are two exceptions. One is Christian Education's total expenses, which are slightly greater than the budget. They had Vacation Bible School and the start-up expenses of the fall program year, which appears to have been partially responsible for this overage. The second exception is Music, which is being reviewed.

The audit firm UHY, LLP has completed and issued their Reviewed Financial Statement for 2017–2018. This statement was presented to and reviewed by the Trustees at their February Meeting. For members who are interested in this report, a copy of it can be obtained by contacting Nancy Sauve or Michael Dabbs. Everything is in good order.

We're continuing the Easter Eve Service tradition begun last year. The energy of our contemporary band provides music for the service and will feature unique and soul-filled songs to convey, and celebrate the Easter Story. The band will feature musical selections from Jesus Christ Superstar and new music for the occasion.

Sunday, April 21st Traditional Service, 10am

Mozart's "Coronation Mass" will be the feature of a very special Easter Service. First performed in 1779 at the Salzburg Cathedral, the mass later took on its nickname in the early 19th century at the Imperial Court in Vienna after becoming the preferred music for coronations. We're presenting select movements from this wonderful piece for choir with string orchestra, brass, oboes and timpani. It will be a joy to share this music with the congregation in celebration of Easter!

MISSIONS AND OUTREACH PAM DABBS

As we finally start to feel the warmth of Spring, it is once again time to think about helping those who are resettling in the United States from other countries. For the past several years, Missions and Outreach has worked with Jewish Family Services (JFS), which is certified by the government as a resettlement organization. During 2018 there were approximately 74 people being resettled in this area, and in 2019 it is projected to be 150.

Our goal is to help JFS with this effort in any way we can. FCC's third annual Easter Egg Giving Tree for Refugee Resettlement is an important way to do that. Over the past two years, we have donated over \$4000 worth of household items and gift cards. Jewish Family Services assisted 75 refugees last year, down significantly from previous years. However, this year they have been authorized to resettle 150 refugees from several different countries including Syria, Israel, Pakistan, Eritrea, Ethiopia, Myanmar (Burma), and Afghanistan. Beginning Sunday, March 31, the Giving Tree in the Mayflower Lobby will have Egg Tags with items listed that you can purchase and donate. You can pick an egg from the tree and bring the purchased item(s) (no gift wrap) back to the church by Easter Sunday, April 21. If you purchase a Gift Card, please consider buying from our FCC Scrip table. Someone will be at the tree each Sunday to assist you and answer any questions. Egg Tags should be returned to the white wicker Easter basket near the tree and not attached to the items, as we re-use the tags. Missions and Outreach thanks you for your support and generosity!

Donations to our **Pantry Box in Mayflower Lobby** are always welcome. Currently, JFS is particularly asking for the following: crunchy peanut butter, tomato paste, men's shaving supplies (razors and shaving foam), and salt and pepper. Thank you for thinking of the food pantry as you do your grocery shopping!

CONTEMPORARY ISSUES—2ND SUNDAY SERIES SARA HOLMES

he Contemporary Issues Series presentation for April will be on the future of non-motorized transportation in Ann Arbor. The title of the presentation is Ann Arbor's bicycling/walking infrastructure: Now and in the future. The presenter will be Raymond Hess, City of Ann Arbor Transportation Manager. The presentation will be Sunday, April 14 at 11a.m. in the Mayflower Room.

Raymond Hess started as Ann Arbor's Transportation Manager in June 2018. He previously served as the Director of Planning Services for the Regional Transportation Commission of Southern Nevada and before that was a Transportation Planner in Bloomington, Indiana.

He'll be sharing the steps Ann Arbor is taking to meet our Vision Zero goal and become a better city for biking and walking. This will be the final 2nd



Sunday presentation for the programing year. Look for a new series beginning in September.

GREAT LAKES SCRIP PROGRAM

TUESDAY NIGHT STUDY GROUP (TNS)


