I am thrilled to share that I have been accepted into the Doctor of Ministry program at ETS and will begin my studies in August! The program is geared toward individuals in full-time

The schedule includes two intensive weeks in August and January and then utilizes cohort groups, organized by dissertation focus, that meet according to group availability. I believe this schedule will fit nicely into the ministry schedule here at FCC and I am excited to return to school after being graduated from seminary for 12 years now. The rapid pace at which our technology has changed the landscape of what it means to be in community, how that community is formed, and how we interact within it has raised critical questions about what it means to be the church of the future. I am honored to be a part of a program where I can gain new insights and engage in my own research into how preaching, leadership, and spiritual formation equip disciples for purpose-filled life in our digital world. I look forward to the growth that will occur intellectually and professionally and that I can share with my faith family at FCC.

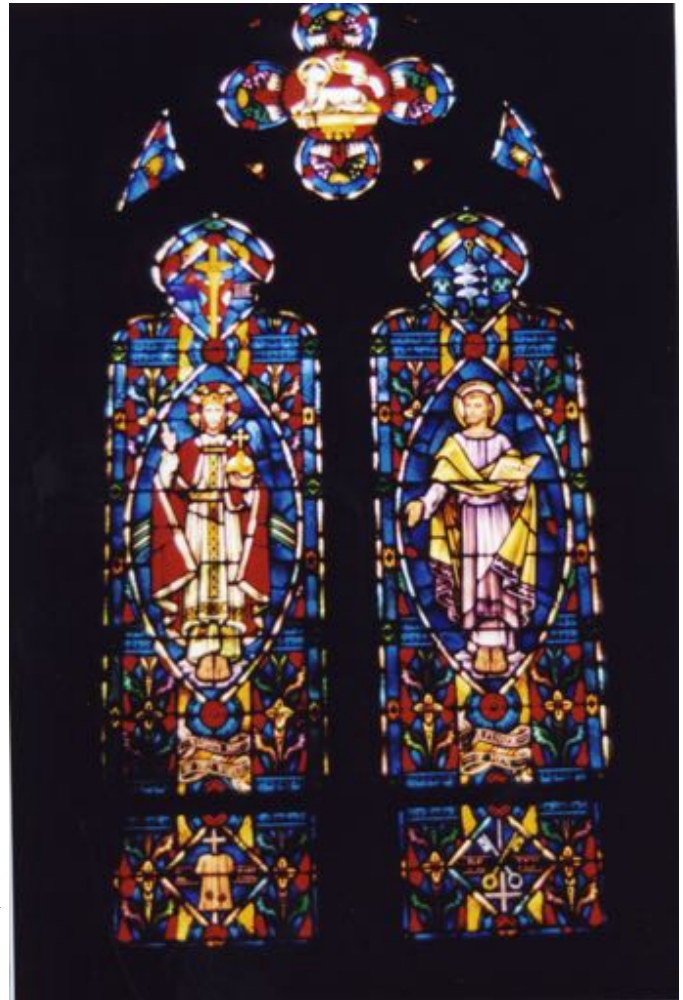
HISTORIAN'S CORNER

BETTY BISHOP

In the spring of 1976, the First Congregational Church of Ann Arbor celebrated 100 years in our present church building at the corner of State and William. The celebrations concluded with the re-dedication of the sanctuary and a banquet on May 26, 1976. A major accomplishment in 1976 was the updating and printing of a history book on the church, which had first been written in 1947, 100 years after the founding of the church. The updated history covered the record of major church activities, profiles of our ministers, the building of the Parish Hall (now called Pilgrim Hall), and Douglas Chapel, as well as various organizational changes which took place between 1947 and 1976. One chapter was devoted to an explanation of the symbolism of the stained glass windows, and good color plates of the windows were included in the book.

Those who contributed to the writing, editing, and publishing of the 1976 history included: James Blow, Amy Hoefle, Dorothy Lenz, Lois Maugh, LaMont Okey, Edna Townsend, Howard Fox, Ray Gilbert, Geneva Nelson, Agnes Nelson, Rita Nicolaides, Ray Steiner, Willis Patterson, Carlton Wells, Ferol Brinkman, Cecil North, and John Leidy, Jr. The Centennial Committee was chaired by Ruth Jones with help from many of those who worked on the history book.

As many of you know, we are now in the process of creating a new revision and update of the church history book, to be published for the 175th Anniversary of the church in 2022. The Board of Trustees met on Monday, May 13. The following items were discussed:

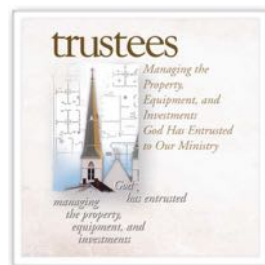
The Stewardship Drive was a success. The final numbers will be available soon.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN DESIGN COMMITTEE

FCC Capital Campaign Improvements are Underway!



At the end of April, FCC's member focus groups and design committee met with Kingscott, the architectural/design firm hired to assist with our Capital Campaign improvements. Follow-up meetings are scheduled for May and June to refine the conceptual designs created during the Master Planning phase last spring. Plan revisions will incorporate focus group input as well as changes reducing the scope of work to match the current funds pledged to the Capital Campaign.

Capital Campaign fundraising continues, in hopes of reaching \$1.75M by this fall (current pledges total \$1.628M). Reaching this goal will enable us to complete the approved reduced scope of work plus Alternate 1 (renovating the lower level restrooms to meet ADA accessibility needs) and Alternate 2 (completion of the Terry and Joan Smith Welcome Center in the Mayflower Lobby area).

The church school area on the lower level has twenty (soon to be twenty-one) new energy efficient, low maintenance, easy to open windows, which provide ventilation and more sunlight than the old ones. Special thanks go out to Scott Allen for devoting countless hours of his time and talents to the window replacement project!

Custom ladders will be installed this summer to allow emergency egress through the lower level windows. Additionally, a wireless intercom/2-way radio system for communication throughout the building will be in operation soon.

Door upgrades, sanctuary improvements and a new Pilgrim Hall roof are planned for this summer and fall; the main project will be bid in January 2020, with work starting after Easter next year.

Finally, a "Green Team" focus group has been assembled to investigate adding solar photovoltaic (PV) panels to the Pilgrim Hall roof and identify strategies for reducing our consumption of resources (with the added benefit of lowering utility costs).

This program will enable members of the congregation to support specific projects in both the Traditional and Contemporary services, such as our special presentations for Advent and Easter.

- Choir robe cleaning services

FCC GREEN TEAM

The newest FCC committee is the Green Team. A group of members are looking at the many ways that our church can reduce our carbon footprint. One added benefit of such an undertaking is that many of these efforts would reduce our energy utility costs. The group will be meeting throughout the summer to put together a plan to install solar photovoltaic (electric) panels on the Pilgrim Hall roof after it is re-roofed this fall. These panels will produce enough electricity to cover 25% of the church's annual electrical needs. The funds to install the panels will come from private investors—FCC members. The Green Team will provide more information on this later this year. In addition, the Green Team will be monitoring our energy use through a program called Energy Star as part of the Ann Arbor 2030 District. This program is working with Ann Arbor property owners to reduce their carbon footprint by 50%. The great thing is that we have already done that for our natural gas consumption with our boiler replacement plan. Part of the group's goal is to provide information on how all of us can do our part both to reduce carbon at church, work and home.
