

Maxie Dunham, former editor of "The Upper Room" magazine and former President of Asbury Theological Seminary, told the following story in his book, *Perceptions*:




Dunham proceeded to point out that often the world is full of people like the boy – people who want to see things happen but want someone else to do it!

Bowling Alone

Reviewing statistics on national church membership and attendance trends is not the most uplifting information to peruse. A Gallup poll published in April of 2019 reported a sharp decrease in church membership in the United States in the last 20 years. In 1999, 70% of Americans reported affiliation with a faith (church, mosque, or synagogue) community. In 2019, that number dropped to 50%. It is the greatest decrease they have seen since they began tracking it.

A flurry of theories exist as to the "why", and another flurry of ideas related to the "how do we fix it." One of the areas of my dissertation interest involves the responses to both of these



questions in a way that integrates the social sciences. Robert Putnam, a professor in political

science who has taught both here at UM and at Harvard, is the author of *Bowling Alone: The Decline and Revival of American Community*. It is a fascinating investigation of the 25-year decline in levels of communal commitment and engagement in America. This decline is in no way limited to church membership and engagement levels; it is a phenomenon that spans the various social membership disciplines; from political affiliations to alumni groups, to simple bridge clubs. The church is not alone in our quandary of how to cope with the change and how to anticipate the future of community engagement. However, we are at a unique position here as Congregationalists who, were founded on a narrative of justice and equality, to engage in this dialogue in ways that are informed and innovative. I am truly excited and humbled to embark on this study in more depth and to bring the fruits of my learnings back to the congregation which inspired me to study them in the first place.

I believe we are not headed for a slow and painful death and disregard, but rather that we are on the brink of redefining who the church is and can be in 2020 and beyond. We are not in the same world as we were in the Gallup poll of 1999. Much has changed. Our desire to understand who Jesus was, to follow in His way, and to journey together, has not. The way that looks and the metrics we use to measure it, however, certainly can. In his book, Beyond Resistance: The Institutional Church Meets the Postmodern World, Rev. John Dorhauer writes: "The church is the church not when its bills are paid. The church is the church not when its pews are full. The church is the church when lives are changed. It is the church when it inspires people to use their time, talent, and resources to serve the common good."

I don't know about you, but I'm inspired to be the church that changes lives. That's a metric I'm interested in investing my life's work towards. Maybe it's not reinvigorating church bowling leagues that will save us. Maybe, in working to changes lives, we actually change the course of the church's future.



ALL-CHURCH VISIT TO CARES FAMILY MAPLES A MICHIGAN MAPLE SYRUP OPERATION

Have you ever wanted to visit a maple syrup making operation in action? Well here's your chance. Jean and John Cares are FCC members who, along with other family members, operate north of Dexter what most would consider to be a large-scale maple syrup making operation. They made 400 gallons of the golden nectar in 2019. It takes 40 gallons of sap to make one gallon of syrup! Their product, Cares Family Maples, is sold at Arbor Farms Market, and Argus Farms.

They have graciously agreed to allow the Activities & Fellowship Committee to organize a tour of their sugarbush facility while it is in operation this season.



John says their boiler/evaporator is as big as a minivan and it loves wood, requiring it be stoked every seven minutes! Maybe they'll let us throw some in? Wear your lumberjack clothing and, **more importantly**, because of farmland and potential muddy conditions, **bring your mud boots** to change into when we get there.

As operating the sugarbush is dependent on the sap running, and therefore the weather, we cannot tell you when they will start tapping trees, collecting sap, and boiling, but we have picked after church on Sunday, March 8th, as the day for the visit, as they will likely be in full production then, or at least will be able to show us most aspects of the operation. It might be best, depending on how many are interested, to carpool from the shopping center east of Dexter, across from Busch's. So, meet there at 1:30 p.m. and we'll head to the Cares' Farm as a group.

Please let us know if you will attend so the AFC and the Cares' can plan accordingly. Syrup will be for sale, cash or check, but the main purpose of this visit is to show people how a serious sugarbush operates. It will be a great AFC event!

AFRICAN AMERICAN HISTORY MONTH

When Carter G. Woodson established Negro History week in 1926, he realized the importance of providing a theme to focus the attention of the public. The intention has never been to dictate or limit the exploration of the Black experience, but to bring to the public's attention important developments that merit emphasis.

2020 Theme - African Americans and the Vote

The year 2020 marks the centennial of the Nineteenth Amendment and the culmination of the women's suffrage movement. The year 2020 also marks the sesquicentennial of the Fifteenth Amendment (1870) and the right of black men to the ballot after the Civil War. The theme speaks, therefore, to the ongoing struggle on the part of both black men and black women for the right to vote. This theme has a rich and long history, which begins at the turn of the nineteenth century, i.e., in the era of the Early Republic, with the states' passage of laws that democratized the vote for white men while disfranchising free black men. Thus, even before the Civil War, black men petitioned their legislatures and the US Congress, seeking to be recognized as voters. Tensions between abolitionists and women's suffragists first surfaced in the aftermath of the Civil War, while black disfranchisement laws in the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries undermined the guarantees in the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Amendments for the great majority of southern blacks until the Voting Rights Act of 1965. The important contribution of black suffragists occurred not only within the larger women's movement, but within the larger black voting rights movement. Through voting-rights campaigns and legal suits from the turn of the twentieth century to the mid-1960s, African Americans made their voices heard as to the importance of the vote. Indeed the fight for black voting rights continues in the courts

today. The theme of the vote should also include the rise of black elected and appointed officials at the local and national levels, campaigns for equal rights legislation, as well as the role of blacks in traditional and alternative political parties.



HISTORIAN'S CORNER BETTY BISHOP



As many of you may know, The First Congregational Church of Ann Arbor was organized and established on March 23, 1847, so we are looking forward to celebrating our 175th anniversary in March 2022. At the first meeting of a small group to talk about leaving the First Presbyterian Church and establishing a Congregational church in Ann Arbor, which was held on February 9, 1847, a committee of three was appointed to select a site on which to build the new church. By March 2nd the committee recommended purchase of a lot at the corner of Washington St. and Fifth Ave. and had purchased the land. The price was

\$600 to be paid in three equal installments in June of 1847, 1848, and 1849. While the church was being constructed, the new Congregational Church obtained permission to hold Sunday services in the Court House. The March 23, 1847 meeting to organize the new church was

held at the First Presbyterian Church, reflecting unusual Christian forbearance and tolerance.

For the first 18 months the church could not succeed in calling a minister since they could offer an annual salary of only \$400. Sunday services were conducted by visiting clergy from nearby communities. In November 1848, Rev. L.S. Hobart of Union City, Michigan accepted the call. The new church was growing with 48 members at the start, 60 by the end of 1847, and 113 by the end of 1850. The new church building was completed and dedicated on June 21, 1849. Sunday services were held at the church but weekly prayer meetings, and some business meetings, were held in members' homes at times. This was probably done to save on fuel and janitorial expenses.

173rd Anniversary All-Church Celebration

On Sunday, March 29 at 11 a.m. in Pilgrim Hall, we will celebrate the 173rd Anniversary of the founding of The First Congregational Church of Ann Arbor. We will have special desserts, a small display about church history, and certificates will be presented to members celebrating 5, 10, 15, or more years (increments of 5) of membership.

As of December 31, 2019, we have completed the first half of FCC's Fiscal Year, which will end as of June 30, 2020. Pledge revenue is slightly more than half of the annual budget, which is good news – and appreciated by the Trustees. Gifts and Other Income also are more than half their respective annual budget amounts. Nearly all expense categories are at half of their respective annual budget amounts, with the exception of Administrative/Office and Christian Education. It is anticipated that these areas will spend less during the second half of this year in order for them to remain within their budgets.

The Trustees expect to receive the 2018-19 Financial Review at their February meeting. Once the Trustees have received it, it will be available for members to review by contacting Nancy Sauve, FCC Bookkeeper.




Check it out...FCC IS Going Green

Once again, we would like to offer our sincere thanks to the five members who, with a positive future vision, set up Soulful Solar LLC to fund this project and show FCC's commitment to being good stewards of the environment. This serves as an inspiration for all of us to strive to live without leaving a negative carbon footprint on our beloved earth.

Here are the two most recent photos showing the crew hauling the 54 solar panels up to the roof...

- The solar system will provide 25% of FCC's current electrical needs on an annual basis.
- Homeland Solar installed the 54 solar panels. (see photo on page 17).
- The new system is expected to generate ~20,000 kWh annually.
