#### **Dear Friends:**

Greetings! I am sitting at my computer 75 days into the Governor's Stay at Home order. Who could have believed this 5 months ago? The world looks so different right now! So with summer on the horizon, let me offer you these thoughts and updates:



First, as a church, and because of your generosity and thoughtfulness, we are doing quite well right now. Yes, indeed, you have been there for us every step along the way...offering us encouragement, support, service to our members and community, and openness to doing church in a new and different way. Thank you! Thank you!

Second, in particular gratitude to our tech-savvy staff (I am not one of them!), our home-based Zoom gatherings and streamed worship videos have been a positive rallying point for our congregation during the week and at worship on Sunday mornings. It seems every week we are learning something new about how to do them better. By the way, I sincerely appreciate your being with us on Sunday mornings! In June, we hope to begin live-streaming our Sunday worship services, with a small production staff, from our church sanctuary. Also, check out our Website for daily devotionals and social videos!

Third, we have a new "Opening the Church Task Force" that will soon begin to meet to talk about when and how we can begin to welcome persons back into our sanctuary for worship. As your senior minister, I remain one who favors being cautious and conservative in moving forward with our opening and will want to closely follow the guidelines of our State and the CDC to make sure we are taking safe and responsible steps. We will keep you posted on our progress and timeline.

Fourth, the staff will continue to work primarily from our homes during the summer months. With the church construction and renovation work now in high gear, I think this only makes good sense. Please know

#### Metamorphosis of Our Church



Do you remember learning about the life cycle of a butterfly in school? They start out as an egg and out hatches a caterpillar. The caterpillar eats, grows, molts its old skin, and continues to grow as it keeps repeating these steps. Eventually the caterpillar attaches itself to one place, sheds its skin for a



last time and reveals its chrysalis. From the outside there isn't anything going on but inside the chrysalis a transformation is taking place. The caterpillar goes through metamorphosis and transitions into a butterfly. When the process is complete the butterfly leaves behind the chrysalis, spreads its wings and flies. The transformation is beautiful!

When I think of the last few months, I feel like our church has been in a chrysalis. From the outside it has appeared like our building doors are shut and nothing is going on. But the truth is that a huge transformation has been occurring! Our worship services have been able to reach new people as we have stretched and learned how to make our services available online. #### HISTORIAN'S CORNER BETTY BISHOP

Just over a hundred years ago the world, and Ann Arbor, were dealing with the challenges of the pandemic of the 1918 flu, sometimes called the Spanish flu. It started in Europe which was still involved in World War I. The countries involved in the War agreed not to report on the flu in the media, but Spain was neutral and did report flu outbreaks and deaths. This led to the pandemic being called the Spanish flu although it did not originate in Spain.



In Michigan about 15,000 died from the flu between October 1918 and April 1919. It especially affected those ages 18-45 with the greatest number of fatalities occurring in those ages 25-34. In Ann Arbor there was a major outbreak among the Student Army Training Corps on the University of Michigan campus. Worldwide about 50 million died, many more than the number who died in World War I. Deaths in the US were about 650,000.



Dean Victor Vaughn of the University of Michigan Medical School said "I daresay the world has never known a pestilence more widespread, more invasive and appalling in its process, or more destructive to life, than this epidemic".

In the fall of 1918 there were widespread closures of schools, theaters, churches, restaurants, skating rinks (roller skating), and dance halls. These closures usually lasted several weeks and varied from city to city and state to state. Parades to celebrate the end of World War I in November 1918 contributed to the spread of the illness in some cities while cities which banned parades had significantly fewer cases. The wearing of masks and social distancing were major practices encouraged to slow the spread of the illness. Eventually enough of the populaimmunity through having the flu that the tion acquired incidence greatly decreased and the pandemic was considered to have ended.

#### Dear good people of FCCAA,



A good heart, a heart like the earth, which drinks up the rain that falls on it and yields a rich harvest."

It is a time when we are trying to be creative to add some joy to our friends' lives. If anyone has an idea please let me know! My phone number is 313-303-1989.




#### THE FCC READING LIST



#### **HEALING SPACE**

#### WHERE MUSIC, MEDITATION AND PRAYER COME TOGETHER

Healing Space was not able to meet this Spring, but perhaps some have been able to take more moments of prayer and meditation with our slower pace. **Meditation** is a helpful process to deepen our spiritual life as well as to bring a sense of peace and serenity to this time of anxiety and uncertainty. It brings us to the NOW where we can listen for God and for direction in our life.

If you would like to foster this practice this summer, please consider these suggestions:

**Sit comfortably** with a straight spine to allow yourself to breathe fully, arms relaxed with hands open, feet grounded on the floor. Close your eyes and remind yourself that God is with you. "Be still and know that I am God "...Psalm 46:10.





Breathe naturally, concentrating on just your breath and finding its slow natural rhythm. Let go of your thoughts and just pay attention to your breath for several minutes. Let any tension or upset be released with each exhale. Let go of your wandering mind and just stay in the now.

For some variety, you can try this option: Consider spending time going through **each of your senses** to heighten your awareness and your connection to what's around you.

Perhaps select a short phrase from Scripture and focus on its message.



Or **take time to ask God** for whatever you are in need of whether it is patience, compassion, understanding, courage, strength...As you continue breathing slowly and calmly, let that flow within yourself. As you find yourself filled, send it to others who are also in need.

Start with 5 or 10 minutes and increase in small increments. Have a loving attitude towards your practice, let go of self-criticism of how you are doing. Consider doing this exercise as a walking meditation as well.

**Smile** when you are finished and enjoy the feelings of peace and calm spending time in God's presence.

We will look forward to when we can gather again as a community.

### 5 Common Online Ordering Questions and Answers



#### 1. How do I sign up for online payments?

You have the option to link a bank account or pay with a credit card.

Link your bank account: On ShopWithScrip. com, log in and select Dashboard > Family Functions > Payment Types and follow the instructions. OR, on MyScripWallet.com, log in and select Menu > Payment Types and follow the instructions.

Pay with your credit card: At checkout on ShopWithScrip.com or MyScripWallet.com on your phone, add your credit card information or select your saved card. Discover, Mastercard, and Visa are accepted.

### 2. How do I reset my PIN to pay with my bank account?

You can only reset your PIN on ShopWithScrip.com, not on MyScripWallet.com. From your cart, if you select bank account as the payment type, you will see a link for "Forgot PIN?" under the space to enter your 4-digit PIN. When you select that link, you'll be asked your security questions and can proceed to reset your PIN.

### 3. I've never ordered eGift cards before. How do they work?

eGift cards are delivered directly to your account instead of being mailed to your coordinator like physical gift cards. Available for more than 400 brands, eGift cards are perfect for last-minute or unplanned purchases, like dining out, a quick shopping trip, or to email someone a last-minute gift.

To shop eGift cards, go to ShopWithScrip.com or MyScripWallet.com on your phone and select Shop > Card Type > eGift Cards.

### 4. How do I find and use eGift cards that I ordered?

When you purchase an eGift card it'll be in your Wallet when it's ready to use. You'll also get an email with instructions on how to use it.

From your Wallet, choose the eGift card to view brand terms of use for instructions on how to use it, and to learn if you should print it or if you can show a digital copy on your phone when shopping at a store. When shopping online, copy and paste the code at checkout to apply it to your purchase.

If the terms of use say you need to provide a printed copy or if you prefer to use a printed version, click on the eGift card from your Wallet and print that page.

### 5. How do I register and add money to a reloadable gift card?

Sign into your account and select the brand you want to register. Choose the Reloadable Card option for that brand, fill in the information, and select Register Card. Now you can add money.

You'll need the card's serial number, then you can name the card so you can differentiate multiple cards from the same brand (like Dad's Starbucks card, Mom's Starbucks card). Reminder that to reload a card, it has to be a gift card that was purchased from ShopWithScrip within the last 12 months, and not have a \$0 balance for more than 60 days.



#### CAPITAL CAMPAIGN NOTE

2019-2020 Mortgage Principal payments will be \$31,698. Capital Campaign will contribute \$30,000 for Principal payments and \$40,000 for capital repair expenses. Neither the Principal payment, nor the capital repair expenses are reflected in the Annual Budget.

#### **REVENUE**

- 1. April pledge payments were \$69,414 compared to \$30,302 last year. This fantastic level of pledge payments allows us to close the gap between actual to budget. The Trustees and I are very appreciative of all members' efforts to make their pledge payments; realizing the extra effort required due to the pandemic. Please continue making an effort to pay your pledges over the next two months of the fiscal year; as we are still short of our year-to-date budget by nearly \$24,000.
- 2. I have revised the potential total revenue shortfall for the fiscal year to \$50,000. Fortunately, our Payroll Protection Program (PPP) loan (this is the one of the federal stimulus loan programs that FCC obtained through its bank, The Bank of Ann Arbor) is expected to mitigate this potential shortfall. For clarity purposes, the PPP loan is not reflected in the financial statement since it is a loan and not revenue. This loan may be forgiven in total, or partially based on documentation that we will need to provide.

#### **EXPENSES**

Actual expenses are within the year-to-date budget and actually, some areas are less than budget. Some of these savings have been realized due to us not having church services. Savings include: reduced utilities, some reduction of payroll with not having a choir and childcare; as well as not filling the Administrative Assistant position until January 2021.

#### TRUSTEES RECEIVE FINANCIAL REVIEW

At May's Trustees' Meeting, the Trustees accepted the Financial Review (similar to an audit) for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2019 from UHY. This is the second year, UHY has done the review, which allowed them to show a comparison of 2019 to 2018. #### Vision Statement


We embrace music as an integral part of our spiritual experience.

#### MISSIONS AND OUTREACH PAM DABBS

We have been very busy over the last couple of months...mostly staying home, but also reaching out to the community in all sorts of ways! The M&O Committee may come up with the ideas, but you, the members of FCC always rise to our call and give and give beyond all expectations! You are a faith community who we as members of the Missions & Outreach Committee, are so proud to represent! Below, please find how you have helped the community during this season of quarantine!

The Covid-19 stay home orders included the closing of our schools and with this came many children who would no longer be getting food at breakfast and lunch through the school system...at least at the very beginning, but then the schools rallied! As a committee, we decided to donate \$500 to Community Action Network (CAN) to help support the needs to feed the children and their families during the initial phase of the quarantine. We have a long term relationship with CAN, which goes back years and years and this just seemed like the right thing to do!

In addition, other groups supporting those in need through food distributions have been heavily drained because of so many more people seeking assistance.
