



The Journey Inward: Nurturing the Soul Through Spiritual Direction

I remember hearing about spiritual direction for the first time, back when I had just enrolled at Harvard Divinity School. The idea of it really struck a chord with me, and I have been involved with different aspects of this tradition for over 15 years. When I look at our lives and communities today, this kind of conversation and practice feels as needed as ever. As we navigate the complexities of our modern lives, many of us seek a deeper



connection, purpose, and understanding of the sacred. In the midst of this quest for meaning, the practice of spiritual direction can help us find our way, offering companionship on the journey of the soul.

One can trace the history of spiritual direction in different ways, yet it remains a timehonored tradition that provides a sacred space for individuals to explore and deepen their spiritual lives. This usually takes place in the context of one-on-one sessions with a trained spiritual director, someone who serves as a compassionate companion and guide on the spiritual journey. Regardless of your religious background or beliefs, spiritual direction is a contemplative practice that embraces the universal human longing for connection and purpose.

The Heart of the Journey

At its core, spiritual direction is about creating a safe and confidential space for selfreflection, discernment, and exploration of one's relationship with the divine. Together with a spiritual director, individuals delve into the depths of their spiritual experiences, joys, challenges, and questions. The focus is not on providing answers but on facilitating a process of deep listening and discernment, helping individuals uncover the wisdom within themselves.

Diverse Paths, Shared Destination

One of the beautiful aspects of spiritual direction is its inclusivity. It embraces individuals from various religious traditions, denominations, and even those on a more secular or contemplative path. Spiritual directors honor the uniqueness of each person's spiritual journey and work collaboratively to discover the sacred in everyday life.

Benefits of Spiritual Direction

It was written in honor of the African king, Balthazar, with text written by Langston Hughes for Bonds. The Ballad premiered in December 1954 in New York and was performed by the George McClain Choir. Although there have been recordings of subsequent perfor-

mances of The Ballad, Margaret Bonds' original orchestration is unpublished and has never been recorded. The cantata is made up of nine movements with parts for soprano, tenor, baritone and choir.

HISTORIAN CORNER BETTY BISHOP




We will continue with our review of the early FCC ministers, covering the period between 1858 and 1876 when the church moved into the present stone building at State and William. The first of this group was Rev. Samuel Cochran, who served from 1858 to 1861. After 18 months, he resigned when the church could not raise his salary. This may have been a result of the Civil War, which had started some months before his resignation. For the next

year there was no regular minister and the church

continued to have financial concerns. Then, Rev. A.F. Baldwin was called and served from 1862 until 1867. He was hired for **\$800 a year** but eventually resigned for financial reasons. His successor, Rev. W.A. Smith, only stayed for a year. During this period, the church decided to cease having





formal installations of pastors; this practice continued for many years with only two exceptions. In April 1869, the church called the Rev. H.L. Hubbell at a salary of

\$2000 a year. He came from Amherst, MA, and was well-liked. Unfortunately he had to resign in October 1875 due to ill health. He did oversee the church during the building and dedication of the Stone Church. When he resigned, the church passed resolutions appreciating his work and the work of his wife; this was the first time a minister's wife had been recognized for her contributions.

TREASURER'S REPORT MIKE DABBS

\$134,186 in pledge revenue has been received during the first four months of this fiscal year. Ideally, we would like pledge revenue to be about 33% of this year's total pledge revenue budget, or \$188,100. By mid-November, pledge revenue had increased to \$196,000 which will greatly assist the church with its cash flow. Loose offerings and other gifts received were nearly \$22,000. Nearly all major expense categories were running less than budget. As a result, our Net Revenue at the end of October was (\$29,612), which is half of what it was last year. Also, you will notice our Actual Total Revenue percent of Budget is 23%, and Actual Total Expenses is 22% for the first four months, which indicates that we are remaining in a positive budget position.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

UHY has begun its work doing a Financial Review of Fiscal Year 2022-23 (July 1, 2022 – Jun 30, 2023). The Trustees anticipate receiving the Financial Review at their January meeting, and once it is accepted, it will be available for review by members.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN WRAPPING UP

Can you believe it was five years ago that we kicked off our capital campaign? When we announced the campaign "Vision 175—Investing in our Future" to prepare our church for its 175th anniversary, our goal was to raise \$2,000,000. Ultimately, we had 183 members pledge \$2,005,735! And as remarkable as the campaign was, today, five years later, we have only \$45,000 in pledges that remain to be paid. Over the next few months, we hope to collect as much of this remaining balance as possible in order to bring the campaign to an end.

In the past month, our Bookkeeper, Crystal, sent all members their current Statement of Giving, which included what may still be owed on their capital campaign pledge. We would appreciate you paying the balance within the next few months, or if life circumstances have changed that prevent you from paying this balance, please contact Crystal, or me.

Sanctuary Water Intrusion Update

Extensive work has been completed on the outside west wall of the Sanctuary building. This included 4 weeks of tuck pointing work, repair to the outside louver vent, and a forensic inspection using water testing to determine where the leak was occurring. A roof flashing, which had deteriorated due to heat and weather, was determined to be the problem. That has now been repaired so we will be moving on to the inside plaster and paint repair when that area is dry enough and the sanctuary is available for a couple of weeks of scaffolding.

Several items not included in the Capital Campaign but needing repair have been accomplished. The stove fan has been replaced, as well as the faucet and shut off valves at the dishwasher sink. Since the new stove is rarely in use and the pilot lights were giving off significant heat and odor, we have decided to shut the gas off between uses. This has made a significant difference in the comfort of the kitchen. A list of people able to




