THOUGHTS FROM DARCY CRAIN SENIOR MINISTER

Dear Friends:

Carter, Ron, Edie, Siri, and Faith, just to name a few. These are all names that have faces and faith journeys that join ours, but we might not even know it. These are members of our online worship community, who join us almost weekly, support our church through their worship



and giving, and call FCC their home. Many of us have the benefit of discussing scripture over breakfast, or talking about hymns or sermons, or that hilarious moment of children's circle, or while we eat cookies and sip coffee at fellowship time, but our online community members do not. This Lent we are offering an opportunity to connect them, and any of us who for a myriad of reasons find inperson worship and fellowship difficult. We'll offer a weekly devotional discussion at noon on Zoom, that includes a time of prayer, centering, reflecting, and sharing as we journey on this spiritual path of Lent together. We began on Thursday, February 22, and will continue through Thursday, March 21. Our gatherings won't be longer than 45 minutes, and will offer a chance to bridge our online and in person communities during a time when we draw nearer to God, and in so doing, nearer to each other too. This opportunity is open to everyone, online and in person alike. If you are looking for something to add to your spiritual discipline as we enter the Lenten season I encourage you to join us for a Thursday.

I'm thrilled to be entering into this season of the church year with the excitement and energy our community has. In the months to come we will walk with Jesus in the last week of his life, we will celebrate the surprise and hope and radical proclamation of resurrection. We will experience, for the first time ever at FCC, the complex and beautiful *Illuminare*, by Elaine Hagenberg. We will confirm a new class of young members of FCC, have family camp on the shores of Lake Michigan, and complete what I believe will be another successful stewardship drive, so that we can build upon the energy, programs, and ministry we offer here at FCC.

There will be stories of how Edie or Siri were some of the first online members to be a part of this community, and how we continued to grow that online. Someone will tell a story of the blessing of the animals, and how some of the dogs were very verbal in their prayer requests.

Our stories will continue to form, and be told. Come be a part of it. This Lent, take a chance and broaden your experience of what it is to be in this living, vibrant, growing community. I'll see you there.

This season of Lent has often been lifted up as a time to wander in the desert and to give things up, whether it is eating meat or sweets. But, our bodies are not just something we need to bring with us on our spiritual journeys. Rather, our senses themselves can be rich pathways to God. While acts of sacrifice and giving up can be powerful practices, so can nurturing and celebrating this God-given fleshy existence of ours. And so, this year I am particularly focused on embodiment practices as a way of connecting to the divine. Embodiment practices invite us to recognize the divine within the tangible, the sacredness of our flesh, bones, and breath. It reminds us that our bodies are not mere vessels, but intricate, living expressions of our journey through existence. If you are curious as well, consider joining me and trying one or more of the following:





Sensory Exploration

Delight in the richness of sensory experiences. Notice the taste, texture, and aroma of food. Revel in the beauty of art, the texture of fabric, or the warmth of a hug. Sensory awareness connects us deeply to the world around us.

Mindful Movement

Engage in practices like yoga, tai chi, or dance to cultivate a conscious connection between body and mind. Through intentional movement, we can explore the nuances of our physical selves, fostering balance and grace.

Breath Awareness

Take moments throughout the day to simply breathe. Conscious breathing grounds us in the present moment, inviting us to experience the fullness of life with each inhale and exhale.





Nature Immersion

Spend time in nature, allowing the elements to awaken your senses. Feel the earth beneath your feet, the breeze against your skin, and the sunlight on your face. Nature reminds us of our inherent connection to the world around us.

Creative Expression

Engage in art, music, or other forms of creative expression that involve your body. Painting, playing an instrument, or even cooking can be profound ways to embody our innermost thoughts and emotions.

Embodied Rituals

Infuse your spiritual practices with physical rituals. Lighting candles, making offerings, or engaging in ceremonial movements can bring a profound sense of presence and intention to our beliefs.

In embracing embodiment, we honor the inherent worth and dignity of everybody, and every body. Through these practices, we can cultivate a deeper sense of presence, compassion, and joy in our shared journey of embodied existence. God indeed calls us to a life overflowing, not of denial. May we bring our whole selves along in lives full of celebration and service.

GARRETT'S SPACE FOR YOUNG ADULTS WITH MENTAL HEALTH CHALLENGES

In February 2023, FCC did a two-week series on mental health and faith. We learned there is a gap in the care our young adults need, and our ability to provide this care for them. One non-profit organization that seeks to close this gap is Garrett's Space. Since the startup of Garrett's Space, our FCC youth have served with them, supporting their mission by getting the word out about who they are and what services they provide. There is more information about Garrett's Space below. Our hope is that you can share it with a young adult in your life who may need the kind of care and treatment they offer.



HOPE, HEALING AND CONNECTION

Garrett's Space is dedicated to reducing suicides and filling critical gaps in supportive care options for young adults, ages 18-28, facing mental health challenges. We are working to restore hope and perspective in this population by promoting connections, self-worth and resilience.

Garrett's Space Julie and Scott Halpert founded Garrett's Space in 2019 after losing their 23-yearold son Garrett to suicide in 2017. The vision for Garrett's Space was informed by

their experiences, those of many other families and leading mental health experts: a continuum of programming designed specifically for young adults, ages 18-28 years old, to improve their mental health, promote connections with peers and community, and save lives. They believe it is critical to create programming and spaces that are evidence-informed, effective, and appeal to struggling young adults who are discouraged by their experience with traditional approaches and options with an institutional feel.



Currently, Garrett's Space hosts three weekly virtual Wellness Groups free of charge for young adults struggling with depression and anxiety, as a supplement to individual therapy and psychiatric intervention. Participants come together weekly with professional facilitators for supported peer groups and breathing and movement exercises. They are also invited to a monthly in-person gathering.

Garrett's Space is also actively working to build a campus, which will provide residential, day, and weekly programming with a non-medical, holistically focused approach. The residence will be an alternative, innovative, and effective support option for young adults and their families. Surrounded by a warm community of caring staff, including social workers and facilitators, guests will stay overnight for three to four weeks and engage in evidence-informed, mood lifting activities including group support, movement, meditation, gardening, art, and nutritious cooking in a natural setting that promotes connections and healing. In August 2023, Garrett's Space purchased a 76-acre property in Superior Township where it plans to build this well-ness campus.

Overnight Encampments are available on two vessels:



The WWII submarine the **USS Silversides Submarine** with 72 bunks is a real WWII submarine that brings history alive by walking where heroes walked.

The US Coast Guard Cutter McLane with

38 bunks is a vessel that served America through Prohibition, World War II and provided many search and rescue operations.



Both vessels have heat, so Overnight Encampments are available all year. All guests receive a guided tour of the Silversides regardless of which vessel they are sleeping on. A minimum of 20 guests is required to spend the night to make an Overnight Encampment available. Unless we have paid for all of the bunks aboard the vessel, we may be sharing it with other guests or groups.

Friday - Sunday: \$40.00; Monday - Thursday: \$35.00; Minimum of 20 participants required to book. Pricing is per person, per night and does not include meals. Looking ahead, perhaps a September/October 2024 Fall Colors Weekend might work nicely, and the weather could also cooperate.

FCC Grants Awarded to Nonprofits

The Committee is pleased to announce the first set of FCC awards granted to local nonprofits. Our charge is to meet the



need for shelter, food, medical help, and clothing in our community. After two months of review of the mission and operations of the sixteen non-profits FCC helped last year, our committee decided to give grants to eleven organizations. Our grantees are Ozone House (youth shelter and counseling), The Shelter Association (emergency shelter and food), Friends in Deed (housing emergencies, utilities, financial mentoring), House by the Side of the Road (clothing), Ypsilanti Meals on Wheels (food, senior and disabled services), Jewish Family Services Refugee Resettlement (housing), SOS Community Services (housing, counseling, pantry), Cass Community Services (housing, food), Corner Health (medical health, food), Hope Clinic (medical, dental health, food), and Avalon Housing (subsidized housing). By paring the number of organizations to eleven, we are able to give a larger award to some of the organizations. The individual awards range from \$6,000 to \$500. Our hope is that the FCC award can make a worthy contribution to the other local support they receive.

We have reserved \$8,000 for local, national, and international needs that arise such as weather emergencies, disasters, and emergency budget requests from local non-profits. We have \$3,650 in grant funds under review for additional awards this spring.

Our M & O budget for grants for the 2023-24 fiscal year is \$33,150. Our budget also includes \$500 for the Our Own Thing Chorale. Additionally, a generous FCC member gave \$2,100 to the grant budget with half of their donation directed to two of our grant recipients. This gives M&O \$36,150 to distribute, thanks to the generosity of our FCC members with their annual pledged donations and gifts. The FCC February Warming Shelter received a separate \$2,500.



Volunteer With Us

Our Committee sees additional ways to help in our community, particularly for the organizations that we fund, and even more so for those we are not able to fund this year. This spring we will begin announcing group projects for members of our church to consider. 

HISTORIAN CORNER BETTY BISHOP

Recently David Beck, Finance Manager for Zion Lutheran Church and a member of FCC, translated an article from the May 31, 1894 copy of the German newspaper "House Friend and Post" which dealt with the First Church of FCC in Ann Arbor. Apparently, it was found when someone was cleaning out a house and was given to Zion Lutheran. It took some time to get someone to translate it from the Old German gothic print, but David eventually did so. The history was prepared with the demolition of the original FCC building from 1849, often called "First Church", to allow for the building of a new Zion Lutheran Church. Zion Lutheran Church had purchased "First Church" in 1875 when FCC had almost completed the current Stone Church at State and William.

The article noted the founding of FCC on March 23, 1847 when a group of settlers from the New England States wanted a service like the one they had experienced in New England. Initially they met in the old courthouse but soon purchased land from Harrison Goodrich and awarded a construction contract. "It was considered at the time that it would be the most beautiful, largest, and respected of local church buildings." Unfortunately, the builder had financial difficulties, and FCC had to hire Fitch Hill who completed the brick church in 1849 for a cost of about \$6,000. Much of the cost was raised by renting out church rooms and by issuing debt (notes?) for the remainder.

Materials for construction were much cheaper in 1849 than those originally purchased in 1894. For example, bricks from R. Doty's Brickyard on Jackson Ave. were \$3.37 ½ per thousand. Oak beams were \$8.00 per thousand feet, and lime, for the mortar, came from a congregation member near Monroe, and arrived in a lumber wagon.

In August 1875, the very new Zion Lutheran congregation purchased the "First Church" for \$4,300, significantly less than it had cost to build it almost 30 years before that time. The Zion congregation came about since there was a disagreement when Bethlehem congregation decided to build a new church in 1873, and excluded a group of members. By July 1875, with oversight from the Ohio Synod, they formed Zion Lutheran Church to take advantage of purchasing the "First Church", which was being sold due to the building of the present church at State and William.

Actual pledge revenue of \$271,900 for the first seven months of this fiscal year is approximately \$60,000 less than our seven months pledge budget. However, Gifts – Operations is more than budget by \$18,300. Other Income is much greater than budget due to Memorial Income and the Pastoral Appeal being significantly above budget by a combined amount of nearly \$60,000.

Nearly all major expense categories ran less than budget with the exception of Maintenance & Utilities. In late fall, we spent over \$65,000 to repair a significant water leak that has been an on-going issue for the past five years. We thought it was solved; however, we recently noticed some additional wet areas, so more work will need to be done before we repair the interior plaster and repaint this section. As a result, our Net Revenue at the end of January was (\$40,011). Lastly, you will notice our Actual Total Revenue percent of Budget is 66% and Actual Total Expenses is 57% for the first seven months, which indicates that we are remaining in a positive financial position.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

UHY has finished the Financial Review of Fiscal Year 2022-23 (July 1, 2022 – Jun 30, 2023) and presented their draft report to the Trustees at their January meeting. The Trustees have accepted the Financial Review and UHY will prepare the final version of it, which will be available to any member who desires to see it.


